Summary of Daily Livelihoods Update

Agriculture

- The Cabinet has approved a Rs.105 per quintal hike in the minimum support price of Wheat to Rs.1840 per quintal for 2018-19 season.
- Agriculture Ministry plans to set up over seed-testing labs and it will increase the 15-20% of crop yield.
- Union Agriculture Minister Radha Mohan Singh said that the government has decided to cover crop damages in wild animal attacks under **Pradhan Mantri fasal Bhima Yojna** in select districts on an experimental basis.
- Union Agriculture and Farmers Welfare Minister Radha Mohan Singh said that the demand for Indian organic produce is high in the global market.
- Prime Minister Narendra Modi said that the government is committed to the welfare of the farmers and constantly working for creating a world class market for them.
- The Government of India is considering bringing the organic produce to get 20 % higher Minimum Support Price (MSP) on Organic Produce. This process is encouraging pesticide free farming in the country.
- Procurement season: Farmers fret as 65% less paddy in mandis this year.
- More than 60% markets sell agricultural produce below MSP. The price of cereal, paddy and oilseed has crashed in more than 1,700 markets, according to government data.
- Drip Irrigation reduce labour cost and increase the food grain output nearly 40%.
- Union Government of India identifies the Agro specific zones under new agriculture export policy. It would
 increase the farmer's income doubling by 2022 and reduce the wastage of food products and exporting agri
 products to the world.
- Union Agriculture & Farmers Welfare Minister Shri Radha Mohan Singh has said that with an aim to double farmers' income, the budget outlay of the agriculture sector has been enhanced by 74.5% to Rs 2,11,694 crore during 2014-2019 as compared to Rs 1,21,082 crore during 2009-2014. The Minister has addressed in the ceremony of Krishi Kumbh 2018 in Lucknow.
- Sikkim Wins UN Award For Becoming World's First Organic State. The "100 per cent organic state" Sikkim, the first in the world, will get the "Oscar for best policies" at a UN ceremony in Rome. It will bolster the efforts to attain the Sustainable Development Goals.
- In Uttarpradesh, the government has procured 53 lakhs of tones wheat early this year. It is surplus than previous achieved in 2012-13. Chief Minister has taken initiative to increase the production of crop.
- Andhra Pradesh's push for chemical-free farming inspires other states. The state government will require about Rs 150 billion over the next few years till 2024 to achieve its goal.
- The Andhra Pradesh government has suggested the farmers to cultivate short duration varieties like jowar, horsegram, cowpea, korra, red gram, green gram and black gram after declaring 296 mandals as drought affected mandals.
- In Andhra Pradesh, Chittoor district collector said that by the next Khariff season, concerted efforts would be made to bring 1.3lakh hectares under ZBNF.

- The Karnataka State Department of Agriculture will organise the annual Organics and Millets International Trade Fair in the Bangalore city from 18th January to 20th January 2019.
- Tribals in border villages of Uttarakhand's Kumaon region are forced to depend on Chinese food grain bought from Nepalese market due to the shortage of supply of government rations
- National Bureau of Agricultural Insect Resources, Bengaluru said that Fall Armyworm has been found in Maharashtra, the dreaded pest considered at threat to global food security.
- In Madhya Pradesh, thousands of women in Dindori have taken up the task of reviving the cultivation of nutrient rich kodo and kutki, thereby marking a noticeable shift from subsistence production to commercial agriculture in this tribal belt home to indigenous groups like Baiga and Gond.
- The Himachal Pradesh Governor Acharya Devvrat called people to adopt the natural farming practices in their field as by adopting ZBNF. It could change the destiny of the country. Even the Chief Minister has urged to adopt natural farming to save soil.
- Kerala prioritizes seed procurement to rehabilitate flood-hit farmers
- M.S. Swaminathan to be awarded World Agriculture Prize. The prize has been instituted by the Indian Council of Food and Agriculture (ICFA) with an aim to recognize individuals who have served humanity through agriculture.

Livelihoods/Employment/Skill Development

- The World Bank supports for the development of 7500 health sub centres as electronic sub centres (e-sub centres).
- On the occasion of Birth Anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi (October 02, 2018,) Small Industries Development Bank of India (SIDBI) launched a National Level Entrepreneurship Awareness Campaign, Udyam Abhilasha in 115 Aspirational Districts in 28 States and reaching to around 15,000 youth.
- World 's largest recruitment drive; 2.37 crore applications for 1.2 lakh railway jobs in India.
- Plagued by shortage of specialists in community health centres in rural areas, states have granted huge salary hikes to pediatricians, surgeons and gynecologists posted in rural areas in states such as Jharkhand and Tripura, these specialists can earn anything between Rs 3 lakh and Rs 3.5 lakh per month. Even then, many are reluctant to join.
- Union Government of India approves bonus to around 12 lakh non-gazetted railway employees.
- Ayushman Bharat CEO Indu Bhusan has said that ten lakh jobs will be created in the health and insurance sector under Pradhan Mantri Jan Arogya Yojana.
- According to Ministry of Statistics and Programme Implementation (MoSPI) the number of new National Pension System (NPS) subscribers during September, 2017 to August, 2018 is estimated at 6, 89,385 persons. More than 1.45 crore new subscribers joined the Employees' Provident Funds (EPF).
- According to CDC's CEO Nick O'Donohoe, the company has over 300 investments in India to support around 350,000 jobs.

Economy

- According to the World Economic Outlook Report by IMF, India's economy is set to grow faster than china's this year. It predicted growth rate of 7.3% for India in the current year and 7.4% in 2019. In 2017, India had recorded a 6.7% growth rate.
- India suffers serious level of hunger ranks 103 on global hunger index 2018. In India, 21% children are under weight for their height. It reflects acute under nutrition as per the Global Hunger Index 2018.
- India Ranked 58th Most Competitive Economy, Makes Largest Gain among G20 Nations.
- India 9th most valuable nation brand in the world; US, China leads the list.
- According to Agricultural and Processed Food Products Export Development Authority (APEDA), Indian Organic food products global demand is on constant increase. It is nearly 39% the total volume of export during 2017-18 was 4.58 lakhs tonnes.
- Corruption has gone up in India during last one year, according to a survey by Transparency International India.

Environment/Climate / Disasters

- India Lost \$80bn to Natural Disasters in Last Two Decades: UN Report.
- Special Report on Global Warming said that Coastal nations and agricultural economies like India would be the worst affected. Decline in crop yields, unprecedented climate extremes and increased susceptibility cloud push poverty by several million by 2050.
- As part of the 149th birth anniversary of Mahatma Gandhi, India has planted 13.26 lakh tress over 1300 km of its network from 15th September 2018 to 2nd October 2018.
- The Ministry of Environment and Forests and Climate Change (MoEFCC) and World Bank said that at least 60% of districts in India are affected by forest fires each year and the top 20 districts in terms of fire frequency are located mainly in the northeast.
- The Ministry of External Affairs said that India has launched a massive operation to provide assistance to the earthquake and tsunami victims in Indonesia. 'Operation Samudra Maitri' for humanitarian assistance was launched.
- Prime Minister Narendra Modi said that Internal Solar Alliance (ISA) can replace Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) in the future as key supplier of energy for the world.
- The government says industry should make use of the new technologies to reduce carbon emissions.

Women & Children

- The International Day of Rural Women is observed every year on October 15 to recognize the crucial role that women and girls play in ensuring the sustainability of rural households and communities, improving rural livelihoods and overall wellbeing.
- Mahila Kisan Diwas was also celebrated on 15th October to increase active participation of women in agriculture & allied sectors.
- More women are getting into farming in India, with the latest Agriculture Census showing a rise in the percentage of female farmers.
- A world Economic Forum (WEF) has found that companies in India experiencing the highest growth prefer hiring men at those technology-led job growth benefits men more than women. The study also found that while one in three companies preferred hiring men, only in 10 companies said they wanted hire more women.
- IMF study says gender diversity is likely to boost productivity growth including in countries like India. The Research Paper said the women bring new skills to the workplace.
- The Government of India has allocated more than 30% funds under various schemes and activities to bring women in the agriculture mainstream. And also 18 % of the agricultural households in India are led by women.

Despite of the identified numbers, allegation against the state & central governments under-reporting the numbers is on rounds. It is estimated that the demand for work will rise since a deficit monsoon negatively impacting Rabi cultivation. On the scheme evaluation front, several questions with respect to the kind of latrines constructed, its usage, connection to sewer lines and its treatment, nature of 1993 ban on manual scavenging to be revoked in spirit are being explored. Over the first seven months of 2018, 533 cases of sexual harassment were identified to be reported across the country. India is now witnessing its own #MeToo movement, a year after this swept United States. Arose on the allegations of rape and molestation against star Harvey Weinstein coming out. This juncture, considered a drive of empowerment of several women to voice out their personal stories of harassment & their perpetrator, using social media as a medium. Allegations of harassment against several prominent personalities across various industries--cinema, television, media, advertising, music and entertainment is increasing day after day. Reducing female underemployment should yield greater gains than an equivalent increase in male employment: gender diversity brings benefits all its own, it said."Women bring new skills to the workplace. This may reflect social norms and their impact on upbringing, social interactions, as well as differences in risk preference and response to incentives, for example. As such, there is an economic benefit from diversity that is, from bringing women into the labour force over and above the benefit resulting from simply having more workers," the IMF said. - India ranks 103 on global hunger index: India is among the 45 countries that have "serious levels of hunger". India has been ranked at the 103rd position among 119 countries on the Global Hunger Index, says a report. According to the report, prepared by Welthungerhilfe and Concern Worldwide, India is among the 45 countries that have "serious levels of hunger". In 2017, India was ranked at the 100th position but ranking for this year is not comparable, it said. The GHI, now in its 13th year, ranks countries based on four key indicators—undernourishment, child mortality, child wasting and child stunting. Child wasting refers to share of children under the age of five who have low weight for their height, reflecting acute under nutrition. India is ranked below many neighbouring countries, including China (25th spot), Nepal (72), Myanmar (68), Sri Lanka (67) and Bangladesh (86). Pakistan is placed at the 106th position. While noting that hunger varies enormously by region, the report said this year's GHI scores for South Asia and Africa south of the Sahara reflect serious levels of hunger. - Recent Downfall of the Indian Rupee: Assessing the trends in India's balance of payments, it is argued that a combination of substantial trade deficit and a significant current account deficit financed predominantly by fickle portfolio investments could have made the rupee vulnerable to the moods of the global capital market. India's huge dependence on oil imports along with high gold and electronic imports could also have played their roles in making the exchange rate volatile. The exchange rate of the Indian rupee has always been an emotive issue in India and has often generated more heat than light. The current episode of the downfall of the rupee is no exception. After all, the movement of the Indian rupee/United States (US) dollar exchange rate from less

than Rs.65 in early April 2018 to almost Rs.73 by the end of September 2018 has turned out to be substantial. Owing to the underlying issues, opinions in this context have a tendency to differ substantially. But, over the last year, the US economy has been showing signs of healthy growth. The job figures are pointing towards historically low un-employment figures and the gross domestic product (GDP) is poised to grow close to 3% in 2019 (IMF 2018). Consequently, the US Fed has started pushing up the reference interest rates and with the recent increase on 26 September, the benchmark rates have crossed the 2% mark for the first time since 2008. - Identifying the 'Poor' and ' Backward': At a household level, the issue of identifying the poor has had two aspects in India, namely estimation of poverty based on the consumption expenditure surveys of the National Sample Survey Office (NSSO) and the identification of the poor through the below poverty line (BPL) census. Estimation of poverty in India has been an issue of much debate and has focused on the issue of what should be the poverty line, defined in terms of a monthly per capita expenditure level. While the Lakdawala Committee methodology and poverty lines (Government of India [Gol] 1993) formed the basis of the official poverty estimates at an all-India level and across states for the year 2004–05, since then there has been no consensus on what are the official estimates of poverty in India (Gol 2016). Estimation of poverty is required for counting the number of the poor, and the state wise and regional estimates of poverty have also been used in the development planning and resource allocation mechanisms. However, what matters for a needy household is whether it is classified as BPL or above poverty line (APL) by the BPL census carried out by the government. Being classified as BPL makes the household eligible for a range of government social assistance programmes targeted at the poor, while being classified as APL implies that the household would only be eligible for those programmes, which are universal in design.
