

Placement oriented training programs which can provide employment to the youth don't seem sufficient. There is a need to design interventions that result in collective marketing centers, processing units and generate self employment.







Israeli Restrictions Gazan Families, says UN Official:

In response to a deteriorating security situation in and around Gaza, in recent weeks Israel has announced a series of heightened restrictions on the movement of people and goods to and from the Gaza Strip, including closures of the Kerem Shalom crossing. The United **Nations** Humanitarian Coordinator, Mr. James Rawley, expressed serious concern regarding the impact of these restrictions on the civilian population. "These measures are resulting in the depletion of stocks of essential supplies, including basic foodstuffs and cooking gas, and undermine the livelihoods and rights of many vulnerable Gazan families", said Mr. Rawley. "If these restrictions continue, the effect upon the Gaza population will be serious".

Grain **Farmers** Diversify To Forestry:

Investment in private forestry is becoming profitable, in Western Kenya due to increased demand for wood fuel by textile and food processing industries. Grain farmers who have invested in commercial forestry are recording huge profits as a result of the high demand for wood products that has outstripped forest plantation establishments.

design(s), we may not achieve what we set enrolment in schools does not mean high go to school after they are six (many go are homogenous in terms of age, ability etc.; generally assumed;

accommodates students of more than one class, quite often; most children are at least 2 grades/classes behind (sad, but true!); design (curriculum, books) is appropriate to the learning level of the students is wrong in majority of the cases; and as children graduate, their learning levels have not shown corresponding improvement. This would mean we need to appreciate the reality more deeply than we currently do.

This example is just an illustration. This could be similarly true of development and poverty reduction programs. We need to have a deeper and extensive ground reality check as often as possible so that we assume as nearly as possible to our reality and therefore we plan accordingly. This planning would not be based on 'feeling' and 'fancy'; not based on the donor-driven assumptions; not based on wild imaginations based on quick surveys and feedback from 'unreal' primary stakeholders etc.

Obviously it is not enough to have a perspective based on reality, a set of strategies that address the issues on ground very clearly with scope for local specificities, planning exercise sheets and allocations. We need timelines, responsibilities fixed and tight follow-up. Of course, we need machinery that delivers these plans with dedication and commitment.

This machinery would include amongst others, cutting edge multiple multi-purpose professionals and community professionals at the front-end and thematic professional support at the back-end to respond as quickly as possible. ICTbased support would enhance the efficiency and reach. Reading, person-based training, per-to-peer learning, immersion, exposure visits, pictures and videos in the local context - together they boost learning levels and possibilities of applying knowledge to use dramatically.

Community social, human and spiritual capital would ensure the usefulness and relevance of the program and its design. This capital both at the community level and at the individual level needs to be nurtured. The processes that take us into better life include both collective efforts and individual efforts and this understanding has to be built into the program design and the machinery's ways of work.

We hope - our Learning Centres could ensure that we remain glued to realities on ground and real efficacy of the processes we design and set in motion. As a result, I guess, our assumptions would be more realistic. Our programs and plans would be more robust. And we would be more humble. 💠

Livelihoods Imageries

A picture, they say speaks louder than a thousand words. This edition of livelihoods' prime focus is on images that speak for themselves and it has strived to put together multitude of occupations of people through the lens of a camera. People engage in a number of profitable activities in their day to day life to earn a living and notch up a meal for themselves and their families. So, efforts of people to earn their living have been captured in the pictures.

Team "livelihoods" went to various places to capture pictures portraying people engaged in activities. Profitable chores around the city, in the rural areas and in the tribal belts have also been clicked. Our team travelled from Hyderabad to as far as Pochampalli, districts of Godavari, Yanam and the neighbouring state of Odisha capturing weaver's looms, fishing hamlets and the bustle of early morning newspaper distribution, vegetable, fruit and flower vending, the hustle of the buyers and sellers in the markets throughout the day.

This pictorial submission portrays various livelihoods one comes across on the footpaths and roadside, around bus-stands and markets, in the belly of forests and seas & deep waters, in agriculture and at construction sites. There are livelihoods that are initiated collectively and yet those which are micro enterprises. Many of the activities seem quite laid-back day to day chores and we don't realize or acknowledge that they actually form an integral part of somebody's existence. The fact that the venture means a lot to the hard-working folks since their sheer survival depends on such gainful activities.

There are several livelihoods which concentrate on garment making on sewing machines and many on handlooms weaving a fabric with vibrant hues and designs, jewelry making on one hand and bag making and creating plates out of paper, leaves ad foils on the other. There are yet those occupations which are related to health and education sectors which are deemed as important service providers. Health sector contributes in providing numerous job opportunities at various levels as compounders, Rural Medical Practitioners (RMP) or Private Medical Practitioners (PMP), ANMs, nurses, traditional healers, pharmacists and ayaahs. Similarly, Education too is one of the lucrative employment providing sectors. People function as teachers, tutors, vendors of books and stationary, stamp-makers and book-binders.

Lots of livelihoods are generated in the informal sector in our country which involves myriad activities like land development, road construction etc and even post harvesting chores. This provides opportunities to casual labourers, agriculture labourers and seasonal labourers. A visual vista has been served depicting all these livelihoods from paddy, pulses, flowers and vegetables & fruits—cultivation to the other agricultural activities and livestock sector. A mapping of various livelihoods has been done through the visuals of the handlooms, rural and tribal genre. Marine fishing and inland fishing are livelihoods which provide living to scores of fisher-folk along the stretching coast line of our country and the lakes and rivers. Our team has visually mapped their efforts in the magazine. Forests generate a myriad of livelihoods. Large portion of casual labour, the tradition of shifting cultivation, the significant NTFP-- Non-timber Forest Produce collection provides lucrative livelihood for the forest dwellers and even tribals too.

The pictures also focus on the efforts of casual labour which provides livelihoods for many people. Efforts, therefore have been made to capture the pictures of those livelihoods which are seen on footpaths, road crossings, around bus-stops, railway platforms and merchandizing on planks placed on stools and in baskets and on carts and bicycles.

This issue has focused on those traditional livelihoods which have formed profitable occupation for many people like that of laundry, pots making, running of a saloon, mostly under the shade of a tree, making of baskets and bags and carpentry and even making of a bell! Though due to urbanization and mechanization and an exodus has been seen, in terms of a shift from traditional livelihoods to work in mechanized sector and factories and industries largely in the form of casual labour.

In trains and buses there are a number of vendors selling food items & beverages, toys and books etc. the transport sector therefore has generated opportunities for many people. The travelers travel in comfort as some of their wants are satisfied which in turn endows a livelihood prospect for the vendors. Technically qualified yet unemployed youth function as chauffeurs, yet another profitable livelihood finds a place in our section on transport sector generated occupations.

The emerging micro and small enterprises have a shining future with the adoption and implementation of technology, utilization of government schemes and support for Small and Micro Enterprises (SME) sector – thereby making the poor especially women self sustainable and economically strong and independent. Hence, an attempt showing pictures illustrating collective initiatives from women banking to women entrepreneurs has been clicked for this magazine. This issue of 'livelihoods' unfolds a visual presentation of Imageries in Livelihoods. Dedicated to all people who struggle for survival.



Author: Alex Halley

Alex Haley penned Roots, which earned him a Pulitzer Prize in 1977. Translated and published into 37 languages.

"Roots" was first published in 1976; it narrates the story of seven generations of Kunta Kinte family. 17 year old boy, Kunta Kinte who is abducted by slave traders. The traumatic sea passage to America is described vividly in a heart wrenching tale. Kunta survives a possible death on the voyage in which many of the Africans succumb and those who reach the American shores are actually half dead than alive. They are sold to work as plantation workers along with Kunta. He lives a life of bondage and the story stretches over five generations holding feebly on to the remnants of African identity. This is a saga of every black family in America which has fought to survive withstanding all odds. The story follows the trials and tribulations and traces his alleged descendents to Haley. The saga was adapted into a television series.

Roots has promoted an extraordinary nexus between past, present and future issues which need to be pondered upon. • Resources


Author: Andre Beteille

Manoharan continues to be in the thoughts and discussions. I ended up reading various mails he has sent over the last 2-3 years. One of them is the text of the Commencement Address of Steve Jobs. Three stories – three endorsements - .

- You can't connect the dots looking forward; you can only connect them looking backwards. So you have to trust that the dots will somehow connect in your future. You have to trust in something — your gut, destiny, life, karma, whatever. This approach has never let me down, and it has made all the difference in my life.
- * The only way to do great work is to love what you do. If you haven't found it yet, keep looking. Don't settle. As with all matters of the heart, you'll know when you find it. And, like any great relationship, it just gets better and better as the years roll on. So keep looking until you find it. Don't settle.
- Remembering that you are going to die is the best way

I know to avoid the trap of thinking you have something to lose. You are already naked. There is no reason not to follow your heart and intuition. They somehow

already know what you truly want to become.... Stay Hungry. Stay Foolish.

During the month I gather that we need to avoid – one who refuses to do anything new; one who always looks for a deal; one who is obsessed with how one spends time; one who does not know what s/he is looking for; one who controls every 'second'; and the one who don't like partner's friends.

This month has endorsed Daniel Goleman's assertion - "Overloading attention shrinks mental control. Life immersed in digital distractions creates a near constant cognitive overload. And that overload wears out self-control." Therefore, let us turn off phones and emails at least 2 hours of our waking time every day and two half days every week; and spend at least an hour a day to read/write/do an activity unconnected with our main work/routine.

Subrato Bagchi describes <u>achievers</u> who save themselves from self-destruction - they are in a marathon of over 40 years; they deliver; they own failures but success; they seek forgiveness; they seek advice from people with higher reputation capital; they listen to the people who love them; they do not succumb to the high testosterone; they do not retrofit the reasoning to the pre-decided pathways; they do not go after recognition; they bother about the company

they keep; they build some 'back up'; when they have to leave, they leave with grace; they respect the system(s); and they trust the larger power of the universe.

To be useful, we need to harness the ability. For this, we need to repeatedly step outside of our comfort zones. Let us acknowledge that it helps; let us embrace the discomfort; let us notice our fears; let us not over-think about it; let us go the whole hog; let us celebrate; and let us reflect. Of course, as JT O'Donnell says, everyday, we need to do some items routinely on a daily basis that add value to ourselves and the world.

I remembered the signal from the inner voice – lose in the flow and keep flowing towards merger in the flow of the universe. In this context, as we live, lead and are led, it is important that we appreciate these universal truths and glued to them -

- * there is diversity and existential equity around us everywhere;
- * our present/potential achievement is infinitesimally small vis-à-vis what we have been 'graced' with;
